Bethlehem Evangelical Church Lutheran School is a community of sinners trusting the forgiveness given the by crucified and risen Christ, offering peace, joy, stability, and purpose to a despairing and chaotic world by sharing this gospel through our words and deeds.

Jesus says, "Whoever confesses Me before men, I will also confess before My Father who is in heaven. But whoever denies Me before men, I will also deny before My Father in heaven." (Matthew 10:32-33, NKJV)

On May 4, we will celebrate Youth Confirmation. While Confirmation is not a sacrament or sacred rite commanded by Christ, it is closely tied to Christ's gifts of baptism and the Lord's Supper and the teaching of God's Word. The very first question I ask our youth confirmands (and any adult who joins Bethlehem through confirmation, public affirmation of faith, or transfer) is this: "Do you this day in the presence of God and of this congregation acknowledge the gifts that God gave you in your Baptism?" (LSB 272)

I love this question. God has given all who have been confirmed excellent gifts in their baptism. The new birth of water and of the Spirit "works the forgiveness of sins, rescues from death and the devil and gives eternal salvation to all who believe this as the words and promises of God declare" (Small Catechism, Baptism, Second).

Confirmation recognizes the completion of the basic level of Christian instruction. Christ's great commission includes two things for making disciples: baptizing and teaching. The baptizing has happened. The basic teachings from the Word of God summarized and presented in Luther's Small Catechism have been taught and learned. For youth, this includes two years of instruction, complete with homework, memory work, projects, and examination. Of course, Catechism class doesn't mark the end of our Christian instruction. We regularly review the catechism as a congregation in a question and answer format once a year, and one section at a time before Sunday School. Pre-marriage counseling is based on the small catechism. And whenever I offer an adult class, anyone is welcome to join as a "refresher." Our ongoing instruction takes place in our daily devotions, weekly worship, and Bible Study attendance (small and large groups). This way, we are equipped to remain firm in the word and in faith until we die, according to the good and gracious will of God.

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Confirmation also looks forward to receiving the Lord's Supper at Bethlehem for the first time. Confirmation is the normal way that we affirm that we have been taught the Small Catechism and that we publicly confess that we adhere to its teachings, which is a key part of who should commune at Bethlehem.

This year, we celebrate the confirmation of 6 young people:

Kayden Leigh Baker started her instruction in our church catechism class and finished her instruction as a student at Bethlehem Lutheran School. Her confirmation verse is John 8:12: Jesus says, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will not walk in darkness but will have the light of life."

Bradley William Hooper joined our school catechism class as a guest over the last 2 years. His confirmation verse is Matthew 7:12a. *Jesus says*, "So whatever you wish that others would do to you, do also to them."

Elayna Kate Humphreys was catechized in our church class on Sundays after the 10:45 service. Her confirmation verse is Romans 1:16a. *I am not ashamed of the gospel, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes.*

Victoria Diana Lindsey is a student at Bethlehem Lutheran School. Her confirmation verse is John 15:9-10. Jesus says, "As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you. Abide in my love. If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love."

Erik James Nelson joined our school catechism class as a guest over the last 2 years. His confirmation verse is Psalm 139:14. I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made. Wonderful are your works; my soul knows it well.

Zoe Christine Witte is a student at Bethlehem Lutheran School. Her confirmation verse is Psalm 100:2-3. *Serve the LORD with gladness! Come into his presence with singing! Know that the LORD, he is God! It is he who made us, and we are his; we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture.*

Matthew 22 35 "...a lawyer, asked [Jesus] a question to test him. 36 "Teacher, which is the great commandment in the Law?" 37 And he said to him, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. 38 This is the great and first commandment. 39 And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. 40 On these two commandments depend all the Law and the Prophets."

I had always assumed that the lawyer in this passage was asking Jesus which of the Ten Commandments was the greatest. The fact that Jesus' response is often taught as a summary of the two tables of the commandments—loving God and loving neighbor—reinforced that belief. Since it's clear that neither of Jesus' responses are found within the Ten Commandments themselves, it is more likely that the lawyer was asking which of the 613 mitzvot—the commandments or religious obligations found throughout the Torah—was the greatest. Like all of the mitzvot, the Ten Commandments were considered divinely inspired but were not necessarily held in higher regard than the rest.

Exodus 10:28 and Deuteronomy 10:4 both refer to the decalogue—the "ten words" that God inscribed on the tablets given to Moses. The actual commandments appear in Exodus 20 and Deuteronomy 5, but, as convenient as it might have been, neither passage provides a numbered list. Traditional Jewish teaching identifies the "ten statements" as beginning with Exodus 20:2–3: "I am the Lord your God who brought you up out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery." The next statement forbids having other gods and includes the prohibition against making graven images. The list continues, culminating in the commandment not to covet.

Different traditions number these commandments in slightly different ways. We share the first commandment with the Eastern Christian and Reformed traditions—"You shall have no other gods." In those traditions, the second commandment explicitly forbids the making of graven images, and the tenth commandment encompasses all forms of coveting. While the ordering differs, the content remains consistent across Roman Catholic, Lutheran, and other Christian groups. Unfortunately, the church in which I was raised didn't provide the youth catechism offered in the Lutheran church. I learned obedience to the commandments primarily through the lens of fear—fear of God's wrath, both temporal and eternal. God seemed like an authoritarian bully to me. My attitude toward the commandments started to change when my children left for college. I found myself wanting to send a list along with them—a guide for others on how these beloved kids of mine should be treated. That list, to my surprise, looked remarkably like the Ten Commandments. Jesus tells us to love our neighbor as ourselves—but what exactly does that look like? We live that out by keeping the commandments. We don't harm, exploit, or steal from others. We don't lie to them or about them. We don't covet what they have. Instead, we protect, honor, and respect them and what belongs to them, regardless of how we may feel about them.

The second table of the Ten Commandments is, in a real sense, God's list of instructions on how to treat the people He loves. And you will never in your life meet anyone whom God does not love—someone for whom Christ did not suffer and die. I used to think of obedience as a compulsory act of the Law, but I've come to realize that obeying God's commandments is actually how we fulfill the second greatest commandment: to love our neighbor as ourselves.


