Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable in Your sight, O LORD, my rock and my redeemer. (Psalm 19:14)

Dearly beloved of Bethlehem,

One of my greatest joys is to teach youth catechism at Bethlehem Lutheran Church AND School. Before I go through each petition of the Lord's Prayer, I spend some time with the students on the basics of prayer (who, what, where, why, when, how).

What is prayer? The answer in the 2017 Edition of <u>Luther's Small Catechism</u> with <u>Explanation</u> states, "Prayer is speaking to God in words and thoughts" (p231). This is a good answer. However, it dawned on me that prayer is MORE than just talking or communicating with God. It's RESPONDING to God in two ways. (1) We respond to whatever we see, hear, experience, think, or feel to God in prayer. And (2) we respond to what we hear, read, or learn from God's Word. Both kinds of responses are important for our prayer life.

To teach (1), I use the list of the different kinds or forms of prayer listed on page 233 in the Catechism:

Confession: In which we acknowledge our sins to God (Psalm 51:1-12)

Request: In which we seek God's help (Psalm 22:11-21)

Intercession: In which we pray for others (Psalm 82:3-4)

Thanksgiving: In which we express our gratitude to God for His gifts (Psalm 118:1-7)

Lamentation/Complaint: In which we express our sorrows to God (Psalm 10) Praise/Adoration: in which we extol God's wonderful deeds and qualities (Psalm 117)

Life in general should spark plenty of responses to God, on behalf of ourselves and for others. There are wonderful gifts which God provides every day. There are significant challenges to our body and soul every day. Respond to God in prayer with all these forms of prayer!

To teach (2), I utilize Martin Luther's, "A Simple Way to Pray." There's an adapted summary and application in our new catechism on pages 360-361. Sometimes,

it's referred to as the I.T.C.P. method. This is a great way to let whatever Bible verse or passage you heard in church or read in devotions sink into your heart and life deeper. If some verse or phrase struck you, positively or negatively, capture that response! Capture that Bible verse and respond to God:

- I. Instruction: Simply quote or paraphrase the Bible verse or phrase that struck you. Lord, you teach me, "...."
- T. Thanksgiving: What gifts, promises or acts of God does that Bible verse tell vou of or remind you of? Thank and praise God for His goodness to you.
- C. Confession: Based on that passage, what have you done or left undone? Have you taken anything from that Bible passage for granted? Do you have doubts? Admit those to God and ask for forgiveness.
- P. Prayer: What needs of body and soul do you have based on that Bible verse? Who else needs to hear, learn, apply, or believe that passage? Pray for them, too.

Having graded their homework, our catechism students from both church and school are understanding and applying these lessons well. I am excited to see them grow and mature, especially as they pray, responding to the various petitions of the Lord's Prayer and the Bible passages that unpack the richness of Jesus' teaching.






Tuesday, October 7th, 5:15 to 7:15 pm

Bethlehem Lutheran School 2025—2026 School Year News

Greetings in the name of our Risen Savior, Jesus Christ!

Now that we are starting October, the school year has settled into its familiar rhythm. Students are growing in grace and knowledge as they learn more about the world around them, and more importantly, God's love for them through Christ. The end of the first quarter is October 17th and report cards will be available to view soon after that. You don't have to wait until then though to see student progress. With our school program Schoolcues, you can always keep up to date on your child's grades.

God has certainly blessed our school throughout its history and that continues in this, our 27th academic year. This year we started the school year with 144 students in preschool - 8th grade. This means that throughout each week, 144 souls will hear the Gospel message of salvation through Christ. We do have a significant percentage of families who do not yet believe in Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior. It is our prayer that the Holy Spirit, working through the believing students and teachers, would work faith in the hearts of those students and families. We ask that this would be your prayer too.

One way that you can support the ministry of Bethlehem Lutheran School is through a night out! We are having a fellowship night at Donato's in Fairborn on Tuesday, October 7th from 5.00pm - 8.00pm. Last year we did this and from 5.30pm - 7.15pm the restaurant was full of Bethlehem people enjoying time with each other along with their excellent pizza. We do receive 20% of the proceeds from people who mention Bethlehem that night and we will use that to help fund our Christmas program.

This year, instead of going off to a conference, the classroom teachers of Bethlehem will engage in some professional learning here on campus on October 3rd. Among other things, the teachers will be spending some time learning more about AI and how to teach students to use it responsibly.

One Spirit Fellowship: Looking Back with Gratitude

About thirty-six years ago, Bethlehem made an effort to encourage in-home Bible study groups. Under Mary Smith's leadership, several groups were formed—each with a Bible study leader and a "captain" who coordinated the details of meetings. Most groups met monthly in someone's home, often sharing a meal together, with the host providing beverages and tableware and the others bringing food.

The One Spirit Fellowship Group quickly grew out of the Young Adult Fellowship Group. Several couples with young children realized they shared more in common with one another than with college students and decided to form a new group. The Young Adult group was pretty crowded with 15-16 people attending. Interestingly, after the two groups split, both still had 15–16 people who attended—it seemed like something of a "seven loaves and fishes" event (Mark 15).

Over the years, I had the privilege of leading most of the One Spirit Bible studies. We generally used studies from The Lutheran Witness, from the LWML, the Lutheran Layman's League, and Good News magazine. I always stayed with LCMS sources to keep our study grounded in sound theology. Through the decades, about 10–12 people at any given time could be counted on as regulars, with many others attending from time to time. I can count more than 56 people who were "regulars" in One Spirit over the years, plus another dozen or so who came occasionally.

Looking back is somewhat bittersweet (you young people will understand one day). Many members left when transferred to other bases. Two were called home to the Lord at too young an age. Yet, the fellowship was rich, and God bore fruit through it. Two members went on to seminary and became pastors, another became a Director of Christian Education, and two couples had sons who also entered the ministry. I like to think our studies and fellowship played some small part in shaping their faith journeys.

Recently, I was struck by Paul's words in his letter to Philemon, addressed "to the church in your house." In the first two centuries, there were no cathedrals or chapels or even store-front missions—only house churches, where believers gathered for Word and Sacrament. The spirit of those first "house churches" still echoes in fellowship groups like One Spirit. Those early Christians knew their Savior and they knew one another. Fellowship groups enable us to know one another as well and so strengthen our bonds in Christ. Though One Spirit has now pretty much run its course—some members are shut-ins, and others face challenges that make gathering difficult—I remain deeply grateful. This group was a blessing to me personally and, I believe, to many others. Our fellowship was one small part of Bethlehem's ministry of drawing people together as "one body and one Spirit" (Ephesians 4:4).

I pray that new efforts to foster fellowship groups will meet with success, building up the church and glorifying God.

Third grade is back in the swing of things this new school year! Students have learned our routines and procedures and how we can be respectful, responsible, and caring at school.


Now, content-wise, students are studying fiction and nonfiction texts, place value and addition in math, the scientific method in science, and timelines in social studies.


