Dear Bethlehem,

We are about to journey with Jesus to the cross once again during the season of Lent. Ash Wednesday is quickly approaching, 5 Mar 2025. In our Lenten Midweek services, Wednesdays at 7:00pm, we will take a unique approach. We will journey with Joseph, son of Jacob, to the cross. While Joseph was not crucified for our salvation, the themes of betrayal, temptation, trials, suffering, forgiveness, reconciliation, God's will, mercy, and endurance have much in common with Jesus' journey to the cross. We will find much in common with Joseph—the same struggles and the same strength in God's good and gracious will. In worship, we will hear portions of Genesis, chapters 30-50 and Luke, chapters 22-23. If you would like the whole picture, please read these chapters before or during Lent.

There are a few things that I cannot explain, but deep down, I know that they are vital to our Christian faith and practice. When they happen, it "feels" good, right, and salutary. Let me share a few examples that I noticed recently.

Last Sunday, in our prayers of the church, we prayed for our enemies as Jesus taught us in Luke 6:27-36:

We implore You, by Your gracious visitation, lead our enemies to true repentance and to have the same love, be of one accord, and share one mind and heart with us and with Your whole Church.

We should pray for our enemies more in our personal and corporate prayers. I cannot explain it, but it is right for us to do so.

Another distinctively Christian belief or practice that I cannot fully explain is the acceptance of God's Word as recorded in the Bible. When I say, "Jesus says" or "Thus says the Lord" before or after reading the Scripture, Christians just listen intently and take it seriously. We don't wonder IF it's the word of God or not. We don't need to be convinced by history or reason as to why a book is in the Bible or not. It just is. As Lutherans, we understand it as Law and Gospel. We hear God convict us of our sin and His call to repentance—Law. We hear God forgive us and reassure us of His grace and love in Christ crucified and risen—Gospel. Every book in the Bible does this!

Finally, Christians naturally desire to hear of Jesus' journey to the cross during Lent and Holy Week, reflect upon it, sing about it, and have our faith strengthened by it. When we suffer and struggle to understand why—we go back to the mystery of Christ's own suffering for our salvation. We also rejoice as we share in the sufferings of Christ. When we feel guilt and shame from our own sin—we find comfort and healing in Christ's wounds.

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Lenten Fast

For various church bodies, notably Catholic and Orthodox, the season of Lent is underscored by an adherence to fasting. The forty days from Ash Wednesday to Holy Saturday mirror our Lord's forty days in the wilderness. Moses and Elijah also fasted for forty days under God's care. But there are instances in the Old Testament where the practice was abused. "For these seventy years, was it for me that you fasted?" (Zec 7:5) The Pharisees routinely made a public show of fasting and Jesus rebuked them after they accused his disciples of not fasting. We know that we are not bound by a command to fast because Jesus fulfilled the Law. But can the practice still be beneficial to us today and why did the apostles and early Christians retain regular fasting?

For many people it is customary to give up something for Lent. But if we are giving up some secret sin, we shouldn't settle to abstain only during Lent. Alternatively, fasting is not about abstaining from sin, but rather the good gifts from God. The Jewish and early Christian practice of occasional fasting strengthened their spiritual discipline. Paul writes in Philippians 4:12: "In any and every circumstance, I have learned the secret of facing plenty and hunger, abundance and need." Temporarily denying our bodily appetites can not only build discipline and fortitude but also remind us of the heavenly food that only Jesus provides. "I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me shall not hunger, and whoever believes in me shall never thirst." (John 6:35)

In our society, many indulgences are available on demand. It isn't easy to turn our attention away from the constant stream of worldly desires. Dedicating more time to prayer and devotion sets our minds on Christ. For some people, adding a form of fasting trains them not to overly rely on earthly gifts.

As Christians, we know that our works cannot save us. We are assured of God's grace freely given through his Word and Sacraments and we look forward to the heavenly feast to come.






