

Yes, we regularly incorporate Psalms in our regular Divine Services—namely, the Introit and Gradual. However, I don't always highlight or quote the Psalms in my preaching and teaching. It isn't common practice within Lutheran churches today. Though, Martin Luther was excellent at referencing the Psalms in his preaching and teaching.

Incorporating the Psalms in our personal and corporate lives as Christians is a very good thing. After all, Jesus used the Psalms in his prayers, teaching, and preaching. The Psalms respond to the good, the bad, and the ugly of life in this sinful world. These words are Holy Spirit approved and supplied. These words express what we often feel—when words don't come easily—to God and to each other.

Chris Nelson had sent this elder article for inclusion in the June/July Star, but in my haste to get the Star out last May, it was forgotten. So here it is, a couple of months late.

Growing up in a small town, every day during summer vacation felt like an endless, open horizon - no rules, no worries - especially when my parents weren't home. Fueled by this newfound freedom, though we loved the TV, video games and A/C that were indoors, my brother and I explored on our bikes, often taking trips to our sense of Eden, Smith's corner store. Smith's held the ultimate temptation for boys our age: baseball cards. We needed these cards. Ripping open those wax packs brought us a sense of adventure. Any pack might contain one of our beloved Indians, a star player, or possibly a hated rival, like a player in the Big Apple.

One sunny morning, we bought several packs, eager to see what treasures they held. When we arrived home, disaster set in - we discovered that we'd locked ourselves out of the house. We panicked. How could we enjoy the day now, stuck outside?! We whined, I blamed my brother, my brother called me a liar, and we brainstormed many excuses. I checked the garage door (locked). My brother tested the windows (locked). We debated climbing through a second-floor window (we were very short). I looked under the welcome mat (no). He searched near our porch for a rock that was suspiciously larger than the others, almost like it contained a key (nope).

Exhausted and desperate, we trudged over to Mrs. Miller's house. With no way to hide our mistake, we faced the inevitable: telling our father. As his work phone rang, we knew that our lives were in his hands and yes, his judgment was swift. Though clearly not happy, Dad agreed to a tremendously inconvenient hourlong lunch break consisting of a 30-minute drive home to unlock the door and a 30-minute drive back to work.

Roughly 30 minutes later, Dad stepped out of his car with the turkey sandwich in his hand that I watched him prepare for his lunch earlier that morning. He said very few words and to our surprise, he did not scold us; he did not lecture us. Our father simply unlocked the door. Just like that, our perfect summer day was restored. The endless possibilities of the day were available to us. We were saved. We thanked him profusely and Dad may have even muttered that he loved us.

Our daily freedom is a gift, but it also leads us into trouble. When we step outside of God's perfect design, we can relieve ourselves of tremendous anxiety if we first call on our Heavenly Father, who loves us more than words can say. God patiently holds the keys to our peace every time we go to Him, confess our mistakes, and seek His forgiveness. This summer as we work, rest, travel, and search for adventure, let us remember that no matter how many keys we think we need to fix our problems, God's grace is always available. He is the one with the key to true peace. Trust in His forgiveness and find rest in His love, all summer long and always.

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
The Epistle of Joy

Pastor England has chosen Paul's beautiful Letter to the Philippians as the study topic for this fall's Wednesday Morning Bible Study. We will begin class on Wednesday, September 10. The class will meet in the Church Library beginning at 9:30 each Wednesday.

Knowing Jesus is a deeply personal and transformative experience. Living as a Jesus-follower means seeing your own story as an embodied expression of Jesus' story. These are the big ideas of Paul's Letter to the Philippians. It is one of his Prison Letters written from Rome. Philippians reveals Paul's intense love for and joy in this congregation. The warmth he shows toward them is unique among his Letters, since the congregation seems to need less discipline than others. He describes the Christian life in all its blessings and goodness, which come from the Lord's work in us.

My prayer is that as we study Philippians, the Lord will work in our lives, transforming our minds to be like Christ's. Pray that we may receive the fullness of His joy in all circumstances and live worthy of His Gospel. For our righteousness is through faith in Christ alone. Knowing Him has "surpassing worth" (3:8).


